Fire & Emergency Medical Services Levy on Ballot March 17

West Carrollton city council unanimously approved legislation to place a 3.9 mill Fire and Emergency Medical Services levy before residents on the March 17, 2020 ballot. The proposed Fire/EMS levy would be a five-year levy that can be renewed after that time. The funds generated will be used exclusively to support the Fire Department.

The city's Fire/EMS Department has relied on part-time employees to fully staff both Fire Stations 56 and 57 for years. Hiring and retaining both full and part-time staff has become increasingly difficult in the last several years - a common problem across the entire Miami Valley.

'While we endeavor to fully operate the stations and apparatus using the current staffing, including the use of overtime, daily emergency response levels can vary. Browning out apparatus or temporarily closing a fire station results in a reduction in our daily firefighting and emergency response force.'

The levy will allow the city to stabilize its emergency response times by hiring

four additional full-time firefighter/paramedics as well as increasing part-time salaries by 10 percent to stay competitive with surrounding municipalities. Another way to attract part-time EMTs is by offering assistance in supplementing the cost of attending paramedic school to further their education. The levy will allow for the city to provide that assistance.

"By having the ability to recruit and retain both full-time and part-time personnel we will be able to fully staff both stations 24/7/365, which is what we strive for every day," states Fire Chief, Chris Barnett.

The levy is expected to generate about \$672,000 per year. If approved, a homeowner would pay approximately 37 cents a day or \$11.10 per month for every \$100,000 of home value.

"We will remain conservative with taxpayer money while providing higher-quality emergency medical response and fire protection for all residents," said Brad Townsend, city manager.

2020 Census

The 2020 Census is coming!
Completed every ten years, the census counts every person in every U.S. state and five U.S. territories beginning April 1, 2020. It is required by law and provides crucial data that helps decide how federal funding is distributed for schools, roads, fire departments and other resources that affect our day-to-day lives.

Census 2020 will be the first time you may complete the questionnaire online. Detailed information will be mailed to you so that you are able to be counted correctly.

You might wonder what you'll be asked. A few of the questions will be: your age, gender, and the number of people who live in your home, including children. The census will never ask for Social Security numbers, bank or credit card numbers, money or donations, or anything related to political parties.

You can also become a 2020 Census taker. The U.S. Census Bureau is in need of temporary employees who will serve as census takers and office workers. To get more information about employment opportunities go to www.2020census.gov/jobs.

Elm St. Bridge and Central Ave. Updates

The Elm Street Bridge reconstruction project is moving forward in March 2020. The project was rebid in the fall of 2019 and Sunesis Construction was chosen as the contractor out of three bids. A pre-construction meeting was set to be held December 19 with construction slated to begin on or about March 1, 2020. The bridge is expected to be closed for approximately four months. Gibbons Road will be open during the construction and used for the detour. Signage indicating the detour route and any road closings will be placed as needed.

The project includes realigning utilities that are currently adjacent to the bridge including water, sanitary sewer and Vectren gas; DP&L and AT&T utility lines were relocated last year.

In order to meet federal flood plain protection requirements, the bridge will be expanded from 23 feet to 78 feet. Two houses were taken down last summer to accommodate the expanded width. Heavy-load limits and a reduction in pedestrian access will continue until the bridge is completed. Funding of the project comes from state funds that include a 50 percent grant through the Ohio Public Works Commission and a 50 percent no-interest loan, according to Rich Norton, service director.

The Central Ave. project is near completion as construction, paving and paving markings have been completed between Miami Ave. and Elm St. The final component of the project will be the installation of mast arm traffic signals at the Miami Ave. and Elm St. intersections. There will also be new timing patterns that

will improve traffic flow in this area. There is an industry-wide backlog in the manufacturing of these traffic poles and they are expected to arrive and be installed around the April timeframe. Additionally, due to the positioning of the new traffic lights, the right turn lane at Miami Ave. and Central Ave. will remain closed until they are installed. "We appreciate your patience as we work on these improvements around the city," stated Rich Norton.



City Budget Approved

West Carrollton city council approved the 2020 municipal budget on December 10. The general fund breakdown of expenditures is 70 percent for city fire and police departments, 11 percent for general government operations, 10 percent for community planning and engagement, and 9 percent for parks upkeep and maintenance. The state, through legislative changes, has taken away approximately \$1.2 million per year of funding assistance. This makes the city budget process even more challenging. To put it in perspective, Tom Reilly, finance director, said the amount is equivalent to approximately 70 percent of the fire department budget alone. Of utmost importance to City Council and staff is the ability to deliver outstanding customer service and value in a financially responsible manner.

Cold Weather is Here

Time to think about freezing pipes. If the temperature is 20 degrees or below you could be subject to freezing pipes. The following suggestions will help to keep your winter water supply flowing!

► Leave a tiny trickle from your faucets. This protects pipes in two ways: it prevents pressure from building up inside pipes and creates a constant flow of water through pipes and that makes freezing less likely.

- ▶Turn up the heat in your home.
- ▶Open vanity or cabinet doors so warm air can reach the pipes under sinks.
- ►If you have exposed pipes inside closets or pantries, leave doors open. Disconnect garden hoses from outdoor faucets. Even "frost proof" faucets can burst if a hose is connected.
- ▶Keep the garage door closed to keep heat in.

If your meter and/or pipes are located in a crawl space, it may be necessary to insulate them or provide a heat source nearby. In the event you have reduced water flow, heat the most vulnerable pipes (usually in basements, crawl spaces or near exterior walls) with a hair dryer. Leave the faucet on while you apply heat. As the ice melts, the flow will increase.

Flood Insurance - Do You Need It?

The National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) flood insurance rates do not differ from company to company or agent to agent. All policy premiums include certain fees and surcharges, so residents should ask the agent about these when discussing a price quote.

The NFIP's Preferred Risk Policy (PRP) offers lower-cost protection for homes and apartments in areas of low to moderate flood risk. These areas of moderate or minimal flood hazards are shown as B, C,

X, AR, and A99 zones on a Flood Insurance Rate Map. Residents can request a review of their flood zone designation if they believe the zone the insurer or lender has determined for the property is incorrect. There is a congressionally-mandated surcharge added to all NFIP policies. For more information, see www.floodsmart. gov. The city's planning and community development department can also assist with questions about flood maps. Call (937) 859-5783.

Community Cat Initiative

The Humane Society of Greater Dayton (Humane Society) is partnering with West Carrollton to help residents tackle cat overpopulation in a positive and proactive way. Stray or 'community cats' can be a challenge to neighborhoods and we want to give residents a humane option for dealing with these cat-related issues.

The 'Community Cat Initiative' is a program available to all West Carrollton residents. Through the program, residents can bring stray or un-owned cats to the Humane Society's main shelter. All cats must be brought to the shelter in a live humane trap. By having cats in traps, you are helping to protect the cats and the staff handling them. You can use your own trap or rent one from the Humane Society. There is a \$75 deposit (fully refunded upon return of the trap). Rental for the trap is just \$1 per day.

The cats are examined for identification (microchip or tattoo.) If identification is found, they work to reunite the cat with its owner. If no identification is found it is considered an 'unowned community cat.' As such, a Humane Society veterinarian will examine the cat, give it vaccines, a flea treatment, and all cats will be spayed or neutered. During this procedure the left ear will be 'tipped' - the universal sign of a spayed or neutered community cat. Once the cat has recovered from surgery, the Humane Society or the person who brought the cat in, will return the altered cat back to where it was originally trapped.



By placing the spayed or neutered cat back into the community – its home - you are not allowing any new, stray cats to come into your neighborhood. If cats were removed completely, new cats will move into those areas. The cats are likely not spayed or neutered and will continue to reproduce. This program has proven to be a very effective and humane way to manage the cat population.

West Carrollton City Schools: Planning for the Future

Since the bond passed on Nov. 5, the planning process of four new school buildings has begun. Phase one will be the design and construction of two new buildings. A pre-kindergarten through first grade building will be constructed at the current Walter Shade site and a building

All planned buildings will fit onto current sites without displacing students. Playgrounds, parking and traffic patterns are also components of the exterior planning process. Interior designs will provide optimal learning environments while ensuring the safety and security of students and staff.

The design process will include input from the community, parents, students and staff. We have already received input from alumni and community members who have suggested they would like to see some of the history of our current buildings reflected in the new schools. We welcome those ideas and look forward to future community forums to discuss the design phases. Phase one will take approximately two years of design and construction before buildings are open. Phase two will then begin and includes construction of a school housing second through fourth graders and a seventh through 12th grade campus.

While design begins for new schools, we remain focused on students. Two students

have recently been recognized for their hard work. Harold Schnell Elementary fifth grader Lilly Wheeler's artwork, focusing on recycling, was chosen to be part of the Montgomery County environmental calendar. Olivia Davis, a senior, was chosen as the Distinguished Young Woman of Montgomery County. She is involved in choir, cheerleading, National Honor Society and the Youth Leadership Board. Olivia was selected to represent Montgomery County at the Distinguished Young Women of Ohio scholarship competition and earned the "Be Your Best Self" scholarship.

These are just two examples of students' successes. We are extremely proud of our entire student body and staff as they work together to provide opportunities for all of our students to succeed.


Fire Safety Tips for the Winter Months

Space Heater Safety

- ▶ Make sure your space heater has a working safety light, alarm, automatic shut-off switch, and a shut-off device to prevent overheating.
- ► Keep all objects, combustible material, people and pets at least three feet away from the space heater.
- ► Never use a space heater in your bathroom. Water and electric appliances don't mix.
- ▶ Plug the space heater directly into a wall outlet. Do not use an extension cord or surge protector when using a space heated.

Fireplace Safety

- ► Have your firebox and chimney inspected at least once per year for cracks and obstructions.
- ► Never burn paper documents, trash or charcoal in your fireplace. It gives off deadly carbon



- ▶ Make sure the damper is open during the use of the fireplace even if there are hot ashes remaining for at least 24 hours after using. Closing the damper could enable hot ashes to heat up and cause a fire.
- ▶ When you clean or remove the ashes, place them in a metal container and place outside on solid ground for at least 24 hours. Dowse the ashes with water if possible. Do not place the container on a wood or combustible deck.
