New River District in the Works

A river district along the Great Miami River in West Carrollton is now a few steps closer to reality. On May 24, West Carrollton City Council voted on, and approved the city manager to enter into a development services agreement between the City, Woodard Development and Dillin Inc.

Details of the agreement include a multimilliondollar multiphase, mixed-used plan to begin the development of 25 acres of city property adjacent to the Exit 47 interchange on Interstate 75.

City Manager Brad Townsend said, "We were deliberate in our intent of acquiring that land so we could maximize the development potential for the city. The Mayor and City Council have had a vision and long-standing plan of creating a vibrant 'destination location' to support not only West Carrollton, but the region from both the north and south."

Per the agreement, Woodard Development and Dillin Inc. will take the next six to nine months to create a master plan to develop the property which will include architectural design standards city's development cost. Additionally, the city is and a robust economic model and project timeline. The plan will also establish terms and conditions for the marketing, sale, and development of the site. The City will also work in conjunction with the developers to assess the current infrastructure and plan for new public utilities and services as needed.

The development plan includes a hotel, medical office building, service retail, restaurants plus townhomes and apartments. The project would be developed in phases, with the first phase more than likely coming out of the ground by 2024. The entire project will take seven to 10 years to complete. The first phase would consist of the medical office building, while the second phase would be the construction of a premium flag hotel, a financial services establishment, free-standing fast casual and premium whitetablecloth restaurants, a standalone building that includes a fast-casual restaurant and service retail occupants and drive-through restaurants and service retail establishments. The third phase is expected to include additional restaurants while the fourth phase would be high-end, market rate townhomes.

The city will compensate the developers with \$120,000 paid in four, semi-annual installments during the first two years of the agreement. There is an existing Tax Increment Financing, or TIF, district which will be used to pay for the actively pursuing public opportunities for grant funds to subsidize the cost and will recoup the the purchase and preparation of the 25 acres from land sales as the development is built out.

Mayor Jeff Sanner said that he and the City Council are very excited about this project.



"We have always been committed to creating and executing a development strategy for the area by the Great Miami River that will have something for everyone – a place for community to gather, to play and live."

Plans for the river district will also include a whitewater park and community gathering space. West Carrollton's stretch of the Great Miami River is the only place that has a viable body of water for boating and enough of a vertical drop for competitive kayaking, a canoe channel and river surfing.

The City will begin by making safety modifications to the low dam, followed by the creation of the whitewater park. Preliminary design could start this fall and construction could launch at the beginning of 2024. Much of the whitewater initiative will be funded by grants from Montgomery County, the state and federal entities along with TIF funds. There would be no increase in taxes for West Carrollton residents.

Service (NWS).



Community Police Academy

What are the Planning Commission & Board of Zoning Appeals?

Have you wondered what the city's Planning Commission (PC) and Board of Zoning Appeals (BZA) do for our citizens? Both groups are made up of West Carrollton citizen volunteers who have expressed an interest in being a part of guiding future growth and development of the community (PC) while administering the city's zoning, signage and property maintenance laws (BZA.) Both groups are comprised of five citizens who apply for the position and then are appointed by the City Council. Volunteers serve five-year terms.

The PC oversees and advises City Council about long-range plans for the city, such as the comprehensive plan which establishes the vision for the future of the community. The PC advises City Council on changes to the codes which implement that vision, including the zoning, sign, and subdivision codes. The PC also reviews and approves plans for new development in the city. The PC is both a legislative and administrative body created under the City Charter and Ohio Revised Code.

The focus of the BZA is to hear and rule on requests for variances from the zoning, sign, and property maintenance codes, as well as administrative appeals of decisions of the zoning enforcement officer. The BZA serves as a quasi-judicial body created under the City Charter and Ohio Revised Code.

An example of a BZA application might be where a citizen applies for a variance to change the set-back in their yard because

there is not enough room to build a shed or addition to a house. This is different from getting a permit to build a shed or addition, but rather is required to be discussed and determined to be acceptable or not acceptable prior to the permitting and building process.

How do I find out about an upcoming PC or BZA meeting?

The city provides public notices in different ways depending upon the type of application. For applications requiring a public hearing at a City Council, PC and/or BZA meeting, the city publishes a legal ad in the local Miami Valley newspaper. The city also mails a notice to abutting property owners/parties of interest not less than 20 days prior to the date of the public hearing.

When holding a public hearing, the city also posts one or more signs on the property and posts the meeting agenda and case materials on the city website (*westcarrollton. org*). Citizens may also request the information in person at the Civic Center, 300 E. Central Ave.


In the interest of being open and transparent with citizens, for applications that don't require a public hearing, the city mails notices to abutting property owners, posts sign(s) and materials on the website.

The public is always welcome to attend a PC or BZA meeting. The PC meets the first Thursday of the month at 6:30 p.m. and the BZA meets the second Thursday of

the month at 6:30 p.m. at the Civic Center, however, both only meet if there is an item(s) on the agenda for review, discussion or decision.

What constitutes the need for a public hearing?

In general, a public hearing is held on any legislative change to city codes and for cases such as variances and conditional use applications when the proposal may substantially alter the essential character of the neighborhood and/or on adjoining properties. In these cases, public testimony by property owners who may be affected is important for the board's/Council's consideration in rendering a decision.

The new Early Childhood Center (preschool to first grade) and Intermediate School (fifth and sixth grade) will be open for the new school year beginning August 24. Other changes in the district will be grade banding students from preschool through sixth grade.

Grade banding has been done for years for all grades except grades one through five. Grade banding allows students to be with the same students for their entire school career, thereby allowing them to form strong relationships; it is also shown to help lessen the anxiety when moving from building to building. Additionally, all grade level teachers will be able to collaborate on a daily basis.

Preschool through first grade will be in the Early Childhood

Center; second and third grade will be at Harold Schnell; fourth graders will be at Harry Russell; fifth and sixth graders will be at the Intermediate School; seventh and eighth grade will be at the Middle School;



ninth through twelfth will be at the High School.



What can you do about higher energy bills?

How do we get electricity to our homes? Why can prices change? Service companies buy 'generated electricity' which is then provided to consumers for their home or business. Because Ohio is a deregulated state, every utility goes to auction annually. After the auction for AES (formerly Dayton Power & Light) closed and customers learned rates in the area will increase as a result.

As has been publicized, the price of electricity is going up everywhere, but you can shop for competitive rates. Prices are based on kilowatts-hour (kWh.) For perspective, a kilowatt-hour is how much energy you need to run a 1,000-watt appliance for an hour. A 100-watt light bulb uses one kWh for every 10 hours of use; an average refrigerator uses about 1.5 kWh a day to run and central air conditioning can use about 3 kWh an hour. This may not sound like much, but when you consider all the different items in your household that use electricity every day, it can add up. Since prices for each kWh are increasing, that can lead to higher monthly bills.

How can you 'shop' for electricity?

There are some basic things to know while shopping for an electricity provider such as who your current electricity supplier is and your 'price to compare.' We encourage residents to shop around and find the best fit for their electric supplier. This online tool from the Public Utility Commission of Ohio (PUCO) can help you compare prices between providers - energychoice. ohio.gov. (Often referred to as the 'apples to apples' website.) Two good sections to check out are 'frequently asked questions' and 'compare offers' when starting your research. Lastly, consumers should be aware of introductory rates which are followed by higher rates, as well as possible termination fees when considering switching providers.

What can you do to prevent stormwater pollution?



1. Remember: Only rain belongs in the drain!

Don't dump anything down storm drains. Be sure to clear away leaves and debris.



2. Minimize runoff by not over-watering your lawn and garden.

Keep sprinklers on a timer to avoid pooling water.

3. Use lawn or garden chemicals sparingly.

Choose organic alternatives when possible and check the weather forecast to avoid applying them before a storm.



5. Clean up pet waste.

Bag up pet waste and dispose of it in the trash to prevent harmful bacteria from washing into local waterways.

6. Make sure storm drains are not running in dry weather.

A stormwater system is designed to carry stormwater. If it hasn't rained in 72 hours, it should not be flowing. Call your municipal stormwater contact if it does.

8. Do not drain your pool, spa, or fountain to a storm drain.

Allow chlorine to dissipate for several days. Test the water to ensure the residual chlorine is zero before slowly draining to a landscaped area. You may be able to drain to a sanitary sewer.
