New Development in the City

On November 24, West Carrollton City Council approved a purchase option agreement with MVAH Partners LLC (MVAH) for 5.3 acres of city owned land located at 1450 Elm St. for \$210,000. The sale of this property paves the way for a new senior housing development in West Carrollton.

"It's been quite some time since the community's had any significant housing development, so this is a big deal for us," Economic Development Director Mike Lucking said, "This project fills a need, providing the city's older residents the option to downsize from single-family homes and remain in the community."

The agreement allows MVAH to move forward on a 180-day due diligence period to evaluate the property and create a site development proposal. MVAH has submitted an application to the Planning Commission to rezone the property to a Residential Planned Unit Development (R-PUD), which would enable the construction of residential units. This application will be reviewed by the Planning Commission in December, and if approved will be forwarded to City Council for consideration of final approval. If City Council grants final approval of the rezoning, MVAH will continue to work with the city's Planning and Community Development Department to define a site design for the property, which also requires approval by the Planning Commission. The City expects MVAH to break ground in late 2021 or early 2022. The number of rental homes to be built has not yet been determined but, the project will have an estimated \$11 million build-out cost which will inject additional investment into the community.

"Our hope is to build a long-term partnership with MVAH that will benefit our community as a

whole," Lucking stated. MVAH Partners LLC, the former affordable housing division of Miller-Valentine Group, is a company that focuses on the development and management of multifamily and senior rental communities throughout the Midwest, and it specializes in serving seniors ages 55 and up.

"We are excited about the prospect of creating new housing opportunities within our community and want to provide an environment for our seniors to live in affordable, quality homes in West Carrollton," said Brad Townsend, city manager.



City Budget Approved

The 2021 West Carrollton city budget was officially approved during the Nov. 24 city council meeting. The city expects flat to modest growth in revenue numbers for 2021 and according to Finance Director Tom Reilly, "we'll approach 2021 with cautious optimism and will continue to look for ways to keep costs down."

The final projections show the general and other city funds are expected to break-even in 2020. Reilly said the biggest obstacle in funding local government

operations continues to be the state government budget decisions to reduce local government revenue sources. However, the availability of the CARES act midway through the year was helpful in achieving the city's financial goals. As Reilly commented, "there were a few extra wrinkles this year but, we came out okay."

For the year 2020, the city's allocations were a bit different than in years past as



approximately 77 percent of the budget provided the citizens with the level of public safety they expect, which includes the police and fire departments. About eight percent of the budget was allocated for general government costs; eight percent on community planning and development and seven percent for maintaining the city infrastructure and parks.

City Council and staff agree that one of the city's greatest achievements is that we deliver outstanding services in a financially responsible manner to all of our citizens. The city provides residents with clean water, sewer services, trash collection, leaf collection, snow removal, neighborhood property maintenance, parks and recreation services, police response, fire and EMS service, tax preparation assistance, and more for about \$90 per month per household.

Reilly hit home when he said that the entire community – citizens, businesses, elected officials and staff – came together as everyone had to adapt to a lot of changes in 2020; "it's very impressive under these circumstances and I credit each and every one of you."

Pet Fire Safety

Keep Pets Away from Lamps, Space Heaters and Candles Pets are curious. If you have an exuberant pet it might knock them over.

Keep Pets Near Entrances When You're Not Home Keep collars on pets and leashes at the ready in case firefighters need to rescue your pet.

Secure Young Pets - Especially Puppies Keep them confined away from potential fire-starting hazards when you're away or not able to keep an eye on them. Use a crate or baby gates.

Keep Pets Away from Electrical Cords Some pets are chewers. Watch pets to make sure they don't chew through electrical cords.

Use a Pet Alert Window Cling Write down the number of pets inside your home and attach the sticker to a front window. This saves rescuers time when trying to locate your pets.

New Firefighters

At the time of print, the West Carrollton Fire Department was in the process of hiring four additional full-time firefighter/EMTs that are expected to be on board at the beginning of January. The ability to hire

these firefighters/ EMTs is entirely due to the passage of the fire levy in April 2020. "We thank the citizens for supporting us and are excited about bringing on new full-time staff so we can serve our community even better," said Fire Chief Chris Barnett.



What is Police Accreditation?

What does police accreditation mean for you, the citizens of West Carrollton?

The West Carrollton Police Department is accredited by the national Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies, Inc. (CALEA.) The accreditation process is a voluntary program for law enforcement agencies in a joint effort with CALEA, The International Association of Chiefs of Police, The National Organization of Black Law Enforcement Executives, The National Sheriff's Association, and the Police Executive Research Forum.

Accreditation means following and providing yearly reporting of a set of national standards determined by the aforementioned agencies. We have been accredited since 1992. Maintaining accreditation is a continuous cycle of yearly assessments by CALEA culminating in re-accreditation every four years.

An important CALEA standard and one that has been given a lot of attention recently is 'Use of Reasonable Force.' Here is a brief description of that standard.

The Use of Reasonable Force standard can be summarized as this: reasonable force may only be used to accomplish lawful objectives when there is not another alternative. De-escalation techniques will be used to avoid any use of force when possible.

Training for this standard encompasses all personnel and **must**:

 include situations requiring immediate action as well as situations using de-escalation techniques (and everything in between);

be comprehensive; and include persons taking emergency calls to those responding to situations;

■ stress the importance and consideration of engagement options with the end goal being the safest action(s) for personnel, the public and the offender.

Section 4.1 of the W.C. Police Department's Use of Force Policy is summarized below.

The policy provides guidelines to meet the public's expectation for the delivery of professional law enforcement services.

■ Our police officers are responsible for protecting life and property and to apprehend criminal offenders. The protection of life is our most important concern; more important than the apprehension of criminal offenders and/ or the protection of property.

Officers shall only use the amount of force that is or appears to be

necessary to bring a person under control. Any force that is used will immediately stop once the person has complied with officer's directions.

■ De-escalation techniques will be used to prevent or reduce the need for force when it is safe and feasible to do so. (i.e. when there is no possible risk of injury to officers, the offender(s) or bystanders)

Examples of situations where force may be used include (but are not limited to) preserving the peace, preventing crimes in progress, preventing suicide or self-inflicted injuries, making lawful arrests or searches, preventing escape from custody and taking mentally ill and/or emotionally disturbed persons into protective custody.

The W.C. Police Department values the preservation of life above all. Our mission is to provide excellent service through leadership and partnership with the community and we are committed to carrying out this mission daily.

Police Receive Gift

The Police Department was recently gifted a framed tribute to "The Brave Men and Women of the West Carrolton Police Department." It included an American flag flown by members of the United States Army's Bravo Company and the United States Air Force's 83rd Expeditionary Rescue Squadron. It flew onboard a CH-47F Chinook helicopter during a joint combat mission with Army Aircrews and Air Force Pararescuemen near Bagram, Afghanistan on June 21, 2020.

United States Army Sergeant Robert Citarella III presented the gift. He is the brother of West Carrollton Police Officer Paige Callahan. Sgt. Citarella and Ofc. Callahan clearly respect and admire the sacrifices each make to protect, serve and fight for freedom every day. Ofc. Callahan remarked, "My brother knows how much I care about my profession and colleagues; and I am grateful he and his crewman chose to give this to my department." "It is a privilege to receive this flag and to think that these courageous men were honoring us as they were braving combat. We encourage everyone to reflect on the cost of our freedom and to pray for the safety of our men and women in the armed forces," said Police Chief Doug Woodard.



West Carrollton Schools

The West Carrollton School District building project is underway. Two groundbreaking ceremonies were held for Phase I of the building project: one at Walter Shade, site of the new prekindergarten through grade one building, and the second at C. F. Holliday, site of the new grades five and six building. Both buildings are scheduled to be open for the 2022-23 school year.

Phase II will be construction of a grades two through four building and a grades seven through 12 campus. The passage of the Building Bond Issue in November 2019 made this project possible. "We appreciate the support of our community to invest in new buildings as well as the support of our recent Operating Levy Renewal," commented Dr. Andrea Townsend, West Carrollton Schools superintendent. Passage of the Operating Levy Renewal did not create any new or increased taxes for residents.

The school district continued to face challenges as the school year progresses.

"Returning all of our students back to the classroom is our goal, but we have to do so in a safe and healthy manner," said Townsend. A spike of COVID-19 cases within the community affects everyone. Contact tracing in schools across Montgomery County, including West Carrollton, shows that there are few cases being spread within schools rather, positive and presumed positive cases are mostly originating through community spread including gatherings of family and/or friends outside of school.

Although positive cases in the West Carrollton school district have remained low, contact tracing has caused quarantines of students and staff. The district made the difficult decision to return to online learning through November 29 in order to keep students and staff safe. Administrators will continue to monitor conditions with Public Health – Dayton and Montgomery County, Dayton Children's Hospital and other Montgomery County school districts as the school year proceeds.
