 We value uncompromised honesty in every aspect of our careers and our department. We shall maintain objectivity, openness, fairness, and responsibility when dealing with all members of the public.












TRAFFIC STATISTICS 2023



TRAFFIC CITATIONS BY RACE 2023




TRAFFIC ACCIDENTS 2023





| Drone | Statistics

In 2023, the West Carrollton PD drone was deployed 42 times in support of WCPD missions and surrounding area Police/Fire requests. The drone was deployed as far away as the Village of Waynesville to assist in locating an Aggravated Menacing suspect outside of the victim's home. The drone was also routinely used to help plan for and observe crowds for city sponsored community events.



- -The Ohio Highway State Patrol was in a vehicle pursuit with a wanted subject on IR 75 N that crashed near St. Rt. 725. The driver, who had multiple felony warrants, fled into a nearby wood line while officers established a perimeter. The WCPD drone was requested and found the suspect low crawling through a dried up creek bed. WCPD drone operators were able direct officers on the ground to the suspect where he was taken into custody.
- -A suspect was actively breaking into cars at night inside the fenced portion of Carmax. The suspect ran and hid when WCPD officers arrived on scene. The drone was deployed and found the suspect hiding in a drainage ditch near IR 75. The drone maintained visual on the suspect as he eventually ran onto Centerville Park Apartments property. The suspect gained access to a vacant apartment unit on Randy Scott Dr. The drone operator directed WCPD Officers to the apartment where the suspect was found hiding in a closet. The suspect was in possession of numerous sets of car keys from Carmax.
- -Miamisburg PD requested the drone to help locate a suicidal female near Rice Field. The drone operator was able to locate a bridge that had not been checked and the female was found hiding under the bridge.
- -Moraine PD requested the drone to help locate a theft suspect from their Walmart. The drone operator located the suspect hiding in bushes near an RTA stop just before the bus arrived.
- -The drone documented numerous fatal, serious injury, and serious property damage crashes for WCPD and TCSU partner agencies.









Neighborhood Watch

The Neighborhood Watch Program is a citizen organized and lead group that connects with the police department on crime trends in specific neighborhoods throughout West Carrollton. Currently, there are two active Neighborhood Watch groups in the City of West Carrollton, the Lindbergh Neighborhood Watch and the Gibbons Neighborhood Watch. Both groups hold quarterly meetings hosted at the police department and lead by Sgt. Biggs.


