
City Launches Community Survey to Guide **Future Planning for Wilson Park Pool**

The City of West Carrollton is seeking resident input as it begins the early stages of evaluating potential improvements at Wilson Park Pool. The Park's Department is conducting a survey that is an important first step in understanding how the community uses the pool and what residents value most.



Wilson Park Pool has long served as a gathering place for families and neighbors during the summer months. As the City reviews long-term needs and future planning considerations, leaders want to ensure the community plays a central role in shaping any updates that may be explored.

Fireplace Safety: Annual Maintenance is the Key to Preventing Winter Hazards

As temperatures drop, many residents turn to their fireplaces for warmth and comfort. Local safety officials are reminding homeowners that regular fireplace maintenance is essential to preventing avoidable winter hazards.



According to industry guidelines, chimneys should be cleaned each year to remove creosote, which is a highly flammable residue that can lead to chimney fires if left unchecked. Routine inspections also help identify structural issues since chimneys and liners can deteriorate over time.

Homeowners who plan to replace a chimney liner are required to contact the City's Building Inspection Department at (937) 859-5184. A permit and inspection during installation ensure that the liner is installed correctly and that it meets the required clearances from combustible materials.

Helpful Reminder: Flood Assistance Resources

The City of West Carrollton wants to ensure that residents are aware of county assistance programs that may be available if a household ever experiences significant flooding issues. These resources can be useful to keep in mind.

Residents may be eligible for help with: essential home repairs or cleanup, temporary housing needs, replacement of important personal items, and general safety or habitability concerns

Being familiar with available resources ahead of time helps residents access support more easily if unexpected situations arise. It also helps county and state agencies better understand community needs when residents submit information through the proper channels.

RESOLVE TO PROTECT YOURSELF FROM SCAMS THIS NEW YEAR

As we welcome in the new year, let's make protecting ourselves against scams a top priority. Ring in 2026 with some smart resolutions to protect your personal information!

Safeguard your social media profiles: Take some time to review the privacy settings on your social media platforms and limit the amount of personal information you share publicly.

Fraudsters may use your social media posts to personalize scams or get access to your accounts without your permission.

Be savvy with QR codes: Quick Response codes, better known as QR codes, are becoming increasingly popular. The scannable codes are commonly used to share links to websites, view restaurant menus, pay for public parking and make other mobile payments, and retrieve digital tickets and boarding passes.



Scammers have noticed the increase in QR codes! They are placing fake QR codes on top of legitimate codes or creating fake QR codes on social media ads to get access to your personal information. If a QR code looks odd or altered, do not scan it.

Use strong passwords and passkeys: Create strong, unique passwords that use numbers, upper and lowercase letters, and special characters. Avoid passwords that are easy to guess, like birthdays/names.

Consider using a password manager to generate unique passwords and securely store them for each of your online accounts. Try using passkeys when they're available. Passkeys – including face scans or fingerprints – allow you to sign in to websites and accounts without a username or password. They are more secure than passwords, faster to use, and resistant to phishing attacks over the phone, email, and social media.

Think before sharing personal information: Phishing is one of the main ways that scammers attempt to trick people into providing personal information. Pay close attention to emails or messages asking for your username, password, or other details about yourself.

Scammers pretend to be from familiar organizations to gain your trust. Be wary of unsolicited calls or emails that claim to be from government agencies, financial institutions, or other trusted companies.

NEW POLICE CHIEF AND DEPUTY POLICE CHIEF APPOINTED



On September 9, 2025, David Wessling was sworn in as the newest Chief of Police for the department, succeeding Chief Doug Woodard, who retired in March 2025. Chief Wessling began his career with the West Carrollton Police Department in February 2001 as a patrol officer. He then advanced through various roles, including road patrol sergeant, administrative

services sergeant, and most recently, deputy chief.

Prior to his tenure at West Carrollton, Chief Wessling served as a Military Police officer in the United States Army and worked as a patrol officer for Jackson Township in western Montgomery County.

Chief Wessling holds a Bachelor of Science in Criminal Justice from Ohio University. He is also a graduate of the Police Executive Leadership College, a Certified Law Enforcement Executive, and an alumnus of the FBI National Academy.

According to City Manager Amber Holloway, "David Wessling's career reflects the highest standards of professionalism, integrity, and service."

"It is an honor to serve the city of West Carrollton as Chief of Police," Wessling said in a statement. "I am proud of the dedication of our department to this city, and I look forward to continuing to build strong partnerships with our residents, businesses, and community leaders as we work together to ensure West Carrollton remains a safe and welcoming place to live, work, and visit."

November 11, 2025, Sergeant Alex Flynn was officially sworn in as the new Deputy Chief of Police.

Sergeant Flynn has been a valued member of the West Carrollton Police Department since June 2012. Prior to his tenure with the department, he served four years in the United States Air Force as a Security Forces

Specialist. He holds a Bachelor's Degree in Criminal Justice from the American Military University and is a graduate of the Ohio Law Enforcement Foundation's Police Executive Leadership College (PELC); is a Certified Law Enforcement Executive (CLEE).

Throughout his career, Sergeant Flynn has taken on various roles, including road patrol officer, detective, and patrol sergeant.

Upon his appointment, Deputy Chief Flynn expressed his gratitude for the support he received throughout the selection process. He emphasized that the department is comprised of an exceptional team, which he believes is the most rewarding aspect of his role. He is eager to continue collaborating with his colleagues in this new capacity and is committed to maintaining positive momentum as the department moves forward.

Breakfast at Station 56: A Morning to Remember!

A Behind-the-Scenes Experience for Local Students

Three West Carrollton Elementary students – Zaylee Caldwell, Macy Jones, and Madalynn Brown - recently spent a memorable morning at Fire Station 56 after winning a coloring contest hosted by the West Carrollton Fire Department.





The students joined firefighters for breakfast in the station's living quarters, where they learned what daily life is like for those who serve the community. After breakfast, they helped with morning equipment checks and explored the gear that helps keep West Carrollton safe.



The visit ended with an experience they will never forget. The students rode to school in a fire engine alongside the crew, waving to classmates and neighbors along the way. It was a morning full of smiles, excitement, and community pride.

Maintaining Excellence: Police Department Advances in CALEA Re-Accreditation

At the end of 2025, the police department completed year 4 of the Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies (CALEA) process, which culminated in an on-site assessment. CALEA was created in 1979 as a credentialing authority through the joint efforts of law enforcement's major executive



associations. The CALEA Accreditation program seals are reserved for use by those public safety agencies that have demonstrated compliance with CALEA Standards and have been awarded CALEA Accreditation by the Commission. The CALEA assessor reviewed 169 total standards, along with numerous sub-standards, finding all to be in compliance. Chief Wessling and Sqt. Biggs will go before the CALEA Commission board in March 2026 for a final review to complete the re-accreditation process. The West Carrollton Police Department has been accredited through CALEA since 1992.

Welcome, Medic 56!

In October, the West Carrollton Fire Department welcomed Medic 56 into service, officially retiring an ambulance that had faithfully served the community for nearly two decades. The new unit represents a forward-looking investment in both patient care and responder safety. Medic 56 provides expanded space to better support patient treatment and is equipped with advanced safety technology, including airbags that deploy from the ambulance walls and integrated harness systems designed to protect occupants during a crash. This innovative system helps secure responders' heads and spines, setting a higher standard for safety in emergency medical response. The department marked the arrival of Medic 56 with a traditional push-in ceremony, a longstanding fire service custom that honors new apparatus entering service. Through investments like this, the West Carrollton Fire Department continues its commitment to community. We are grateful to our taxpayers for making this purchase possible and for supporting our mission to protect residents, families, and businesses throughout West Carrollton.

2026 Dog License Renewal

Get Your Dog Tags!

It's that time of year again! The City of West Carrollton and Montgomery County Animal Resource Center have teamed up to make getting your dog licensed easier than ever.

Why License Your Dog?

Licensing isn't just a requirement—it's a quick way to ensure you're notified if your lost pet is found. All dogs 3 months or older must be licensed.

3 Easy Ways to License Your Dog:

- Online: Apply or renew at www.mcohio.org/dogs/
- 2. Mail: Print an application and mail it with a check
- 3. In-Person: Purchase tags at the West Carrollton Civic Center on:
 - Sunday, January 4th, 1-4p
 - Wednesday, January 14th, 4-7p
 - Sunday, January 18th, 1-4p
 - Wednesday, January 28th, 3-6p

License Fees:

- \$20 for all spayed/neutered dogs and dogs 9 months or
- \$24 for all unspayed/unneutered dogs

Exceptions for Unaltered Dogs:

The \$20 rate applies to dogs that qualify with veterinary certification due to age or medical condition, registered breeding/show dogs (AKC), and hunting dogs with a current hunting license.

- Cash (exact change preferred)
- Check
- Credit card (2.4% service fee applies)



Reserve a Park Shelter for 2026

Your Perfect Park Gathering Starts Here

City Park shelters are available to reserve for use between May 25 and September 7, 2026. Reservations open to West Carrollton residents on March 1 and non-residents on April 1. You can reserve a shelter in person at the Civic Center (8 a.m. to 3 p.m., Mon-Fri) or call the Parks & Recreation Department at (937) 859-5182.

All shelters include picnic tables, and leash laws apply to all dogs in the parks. Shelter amenities vary by park:

- Wilson Park: Pavilion, three shelters with electricity, two playgrounds, basketball and tennis courts, volleyball net, and restrooms.
- Weidner Park: One shelter with electricity, playground, basketball and tennis courts, and restrooms.
- Hintermeister Park: One shelter (no electricity), playground, basketball court, and restrooms.
- Leiwig Park: One shelter (no electricity), playground, and basket,ball court.

Tax Season is Approaching!

As we approach tax season, the City of West Carrollton wants to help make the filing process as smooth as possible for residents. Filing early can help you avoid long lines and stress, and our city staff is here to assist with your city tax return preparations at no cost.

Get Assistance at the Civic Center

City staff can help you complete your city tax paperwork in person, Monday through Friday from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., at the Civic Center. No appointment is necessary. Just bring copies of all W-2s, other sources of taxable income, and the first two pages of your federal 1040. This free service applies only to City of West Carrollton tax returns, not federal or state filings.





Options to Submit Your Tax Return

- 1. In-Person Drop-Off: Use the secure drop box at the Civic Center's utility window. Simply drop your paperwork into the box, and our tax team will handle the rest.
- 2. Mail-In: Send completed tax forms, signed and accompanied by all necessary income documentation,

3. Online Filing: File your local income taxes conveniently online! Visit www.westcarrollton.org and navigate to the Finance/Income Tax page. Here, you'll find the city's online filing software, which allows you to file and pay electronically.

Important Deadlines and Requirements:

Mark your calendars—April 15, 2026, is the final deadline for all tax filings and payments to avoid penalties. Whether you owe taxes or not, all West Carrollton residents aged 18 and over must file a city income tax return. Ensure all mail-in forms are postmarked by April 15 to be considered on time.

To avoid last-minute stress, consider filing early and letting our tax team assist if needed. The city's website provides more information, including FAQs and additional resources. Thank you for being a proactive part of our community, and here's to a smooth tax season for all!
